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UGRA Recognizes Summer Study Volunteers

At an appreciation luncheon on September 30, 2016, UGRA Outreach and Education Committee Chair Diane McMahon and UGRA staff recognized UGRA's Volunteer Summer Study Program participants. The volunteers received a certificate of appreciation and a report describing the E. coli bacteria test results from the sites they sampled during June – August. UGRA staff also presented additional details about the results and background on the testing procedure to the volunteers.

E. coli bacteria is an indicator of water contamination and is used to assess the risk of contracting a water borne illness while swimming. Therefore, each summer, UGRA tests E. coli bacteria levels at twenty-one popular swimming holes throughout Kerr County. UGRA began the Volunteer Summer Study Program in 2004 to supplement water quality data collected by UGRA staff.

“The data collected by our volunteers expands the number of sites we monitor routinely and helps us identify areas that may need further investigation,” said Tara Bushnoe, Natural Resources Coordinator. Interested members of the community typically volunteer to collect water samples for bacteria analysis at a location that complements existing UGRA monitoring programs.

This summer UGRA was assisted by 26 volunteers who collected 327 samples at 29 locations throughout Kerr County. Please send your contact information to UGRA (tbushnoe@ugra.org) if you would like to receive notices regarding the 2017 Volunteer Summer Study.
